MOXON VISE AND TABLE

At this point in my woodworking hobby I am unable to bend over and work on my projects without my back complaining. I am now working on a dining room chair prototype that has 18 mortise and tenon joints. I needed to raise my work high enough to keep from bending over and to be able to hold it tight at the same time. My solution was a Moxon Vise with a table added for additional work-space.

There are several options available for the handles and screws. I chose the Bench Crafted package, two day deliver from the west coast via priority mail. Tools for Working Wood also has a good selection.



I just happened to have a piece of 5/4" X 11-1/2" X 90" Beech in my lumber stack. Beech is dense and heavy, and to keep the weight down, I

chose to make it 22" wide, providing almost 16" between the screws. A 13x22" table top provides enough work area for most of my projects. A surprise benefit was that since the working area is closer to my face I can see things easier with my tri-focal glasses.

HOST—SAFETY, SUCCESS

You've all seen plenty of words about qualifying to use the Guild workshop, the final step being the Hands On Safety Test, HOST.

Why do we do it? We encountered a few near misses, nervous shop attendants discovering the lack of skill of many users, and a couple of accidents.

The HOST was then designed to have a member perform a series of exercise on all machines. You are unguided and must demonstrate, not precision, but safe performance of common operations on each machine. It's been working well, but...

We're seeing the occasional member fail some part of the test, to be recommended to get some additional training.

Is it embarrassing?

Possibly, especially if others are present. We do not want it to be. If the examiner suggested you take a little refresher training and come back, would you?

We want all members to feel excited and comfortable with the process and become an active members.

We have a concern that people might not be taking it seriously enough up front, perhaps explaining some of the failures. You can look at the test on the website and think it's pretty simple. Did you have a high school shop class? Or do you watch DIY channels? It all does look kind of easy. In a way it is. In a way it is not. Anything is easy if you know how to do it.

We don't you showing up full of confidence from a perhaps rusty memory of what is required, and not make the grade. It's as hard on us to say no as it is on you to hear it.

What can you and we do? Practice. Study.

HOST CREDIT, \$60

When you pay for and take the HOST, you are entitled to a \$60 credit when you purchase a Shop Use Card.

To get that credit, let the treasurer know by e-mail that you are buying a shop card on PayPal for \$150 and want the HOST credit.

You will receive your Shop Use card along with a \$60 check. Alternately you can send a check for \$90 with the same note and you will get your your card.

Either way works. Sorry that we don't have a more on-line way to handle it.

Please note that I need to have received the \$60 HOST fee. I will check the records before applying the credit.

SHOP USE DURING MIGUEL'S STAY

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Miguel Gómez-Ibáñez will be here for several weeks this summer. He is the current president of the North Bennet Street School in Boston. See their web site for details at www.nbss.edu.

During his stay, you can stop by the Guild shop and get a little advice from him. To take advantage of this rare opportunity for advice from a world renowned woodworker, you must be certified to be in the Guild workshop under normal shop use terms.

At a minimum, this means that you must have been through the Safety & Orientation Meeting and have purchased a Shop Use Card. A visit will cost you a single punch per shift, as usual.

In detail this means, shop qualified:

You must have at least a **White card** which indicates that you have had the Safety & Orientation class entitling you to be in the BENCH ROOM during active member open shop time.

If you have at least one **colored sticker** on a White card you can be in the MACHINE ROOM and are welcome to use that machines designated by the stickers.

If you have a **Green Card**, in the MACHINE ROOM you can use all machines that match your qualification.

In addition, purchase shop time:

If you are going to be using machines you must have or purchase a **Shop Use Card**. Miguel can show you how to use a machine, but you can not actually use it yourself unless you have passed the HOST portion of that machine and have a Shop Use Card.

Shop Attendants are also free to ask for advice. This will not be lengthy coaching, but he will be glad to answer questions and demonstrate technique.



Michael Fortune will be here from 9/26-10/2. He will teach several classes, some on the band saw. The shop will be closed to normal use during this period.

KITS: THE PRODUCT BUILD GROUP

A couple of months ago when I dropped by the shop for a Product Build session, I found several Guild folks working on these kits for the Clackamas Fair. The photos disappeared onto the hard drive somewhere and were discovered today. They tell a story that I wanted to repeat.

Pictured here, Jim Madaras and Phil Scott are checking fit on a birdhouse kit. I discovered quite a bit of thought went into this little kit, from the practical and bird's perspective. Features I will include in my own future builds.



The bottom has the corners cut off. Drainage in the unlikely event of a rain leak- or the babies spilling their bowl of milk.



The peak of the side is clipped, to allow ventilation, air entering through the bottom can flow up and out the roof keeping the interior temperature more stable. Wonderful suggestions.

The kits will be nailed together by youngsters who attend the Fair. This is the Guild's third appearance. Everyone participating talks about how rewarding it is.

The new additional choices are SIGs, Shop Events, Community Projects, Monthly Program, Woodworking Shows & Social.

Many of you have used the profile editing to modify your original choices. Thank you for doing that. The new categories have been added to the master database and you are automatically 'opted in'. I tried not to modify your original selections. The new categories are emails you would have received anyway under a global email blast, so in that regard nothing has changed for you. But if for example, you don't want to know about "Woodworking Shows", you can edit your profile at any time.

A few of you had **unsubscribed** to email blasts. That mean you have been receiving absolutely no email from the Guild, including newsletter notification. I reset those records, so you will start receiving some emails for the new categories. Please edit your profile to fit your needs.

Note to everyone: Please do not use UNSUBSCRIBE at the bottom of an email. This cuts you off from every kind of email. You won't get newsletter notices for example.

I have a promise from all administrators that we will use these new filters. There will be no more guild wide emails except where the Board of Directors finds it very important to notify everyone. The newsletter notification is one of those situations..

We hope this will make your Guild inbox more friendly. I can add additional categories if good ideas arise. I will not be able to "opt in" automatically on any future additions, but they can be added. A newsletter comment would trigger you to opt in.

New members are automatically subscribed to all categories and can filter them down as desired.

Noon, the zenith.

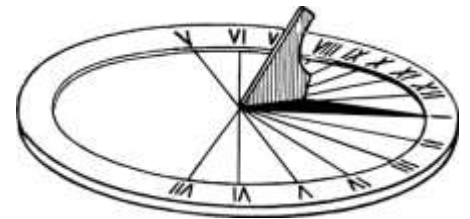
The maturing young adult is

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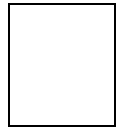
