

GUILD MEMBERSHIP GROWTH


In July, the Guild reached an all-time high in total membership - more than 1,100 members spanning all types of membership. Over 90 percent are individual or family members.

The rate of new membership growth has increased over the last two years, as illustrated in the chart below. The three-month rolling average has gone from 26 new members per month in September 2021 to 48 per month in August of 2023. During early 2023, the 3-month rolling average exceeded 50 per month.

Some of the Guild's growth may be associated with the COVID pandemic. People were looking for creative outlets, and some turned to woodworking. Other factors, like our community service activities, have created increased

awareness of the Guild. The Guild is attractive as it offers broad education programs and, of course, the Shop.

Our membership growth has strained our ability to provide safety training, educational opportunities, and shop access. These are limited by our volunteer groups of instructors, class assistants, and shop attendants. To better match our growth with our ability to provide a positive experience, the Guild implemented a membership pause in April which resulted in a much-needed time for us to catch up on training. Beginning in July, a 40-person per month cap on new memberships was started. These steps were taken in an effort to better serve new members. The Board and Membership Committee will continue to evaluate ways to manage growth in line with our ability to train, educate, and support new members.

GRADING LUMBER

Woodworkers buying wood for a project are sometimes surprised when they discover that hardwoods are graded at the mill that cuts the logs to a standard that judges for utility and usable lumber, and *not* appearance. The actual decision by the trained grader takes about two to three seconds per board for the person, lumber rule in hand, to decide on which of the five standard grades apply.

The concept is simple: defects alone matter since most wood used commercially will be stained, the final color chosen by the manufacturer. The standard grades are firsts and seconds (FAS), selects, No. 1 common, No. 2 common, and No. 3 common. The last is usually reserved for pallets and shipping crates. If a retailer mixes the top two grades it is called selects and better. FAS, which was once two different grades, is often further divided to provide an inventory of FAS one side.

The more expensive grades have more productive "cuttings" of clear wood for whatever the buyer is making. A cutting unit is 12 square inches of board surface, which can be long and thin or short and wide. The cuttings in each board represent the clear, knot-free wood available. The rules vary slightly by species depending on the value of the wood species. All cutting and grading is designed to maximize the value of the timber. Wide boards will usually be ripped narrower to increase the grade and the value.

To read the complete rules contact the National Hardwood Lumber Association,, PO Box 34518, Memphis, TN 38184. Their pocket-size rule book is \$10.00, including postage, available in four languages. The patented, hooked grading rule is \$116 in several lengths. Finally, if is sometimes suggested that the custom woodworker should consider buying No. 1 common since it will cost about 40% less than FAS.

Instructors as Independent Contractors: The Board recently determined a new and clearer policy regarding any payment to instructors. Such occurrences will be limited to only those situations where the instructor has a past or current history of providing related services to the community via an established business relationship...much like we have done in the past with our Visiting Masters. A simple contract will be completed between the Guild and the contractor for instructional services. By policy, Education leadership will prioritize using only volunteer instructors for all safety and basic woodworking classes.

Kelly Parker Workshops: We have another International Master coming to the Guild in October. Kelly Parker has been here before and we know that the two workshops coming up in October will be great! Instructors Coming to Town: Kelly Parker

KELLY PARKER - October 16 - 22

Summer is rapidly coming to an end. It's time to get back into the shop and Studio to make something and learn new skills!

Kelly Parker is returning to Portland in October.

Kelly has just completed a workshop in Florida on making this trio of decorative boxes using advanced band saw and router table techniques. She is bringing this workshop and an embellishment workshop to Portland October 16 - 22. You can see

From Kelly – "This class is so much more than everyone just using my jigs to step sequentially through the operations to create these boxes. To me this is a problem-solving class. I'll talk through each jig, how and why I made it (i.e., the problem it was solving), and common elements of all jigs. I really want folks to take away the

importance of jigs and their role in safely, accurately, and repeatably doing an operation. This is an important skill to develop as we start designing our own work. Given the size of the boxes (3", 4", and 5" tall) there is special emphasis on working safely with small parts."

The box workshop focuses on the techniques and process to fabricate curved forms on the band saw, make the necessary joinery to pull it all together, and address some embellishment techniques. The embellishment workshop delves more deeply into various embellishment techniques that can be applied to any project. If you think you don't have the skills for this class we will have plenty of class assistants available to coach students as you learn some next level band saw and router skills, as well as embellishment techniques.

INSTRUCTORS COMING TO TOWN: PHILIP MORLEY

PHILIP MORLEY - January 15 - 21, 2024

Philip Morley is coming to Portland!

Philip will be teaching the design and techniques of his wall cabinet featured in FW Issue No. 291 (Dec. 2021).

In this seven day workshop students will build a Morley Wall Cabinet. This wall cabinet was inspired by



the works of James Krenov with a Scandinavian influence. Philip designed this piece originally for a client who wanted to display some small pieces of artwork in a tasteful way with the cabinet itself being a statement of art. The cabinet is also grounded in traditional joinery making it a piece built with integrity.



Students in the class will learn:

mortise and tenon joinery, frame and panel door, how to cut their own shop-sawn veneer, smooth drawer construction without the use of hardware, how to cut dovetails, a bending technique using a saw kerf and vacuum bag, how to use forms in conjunction with a vacuum bag, and edge profiling by hand.

Philip Morley is a custom furniture maker located near Austin, Texas. His studio is a one-man shop in which he designs and builds one-of-a-kind furniture for clients across the United States. His studio is also his home where he resides with his wife and four children. Philip was originally trained at age 16 in carpentry and joinery under the City Guilds of London, England. He had the opportunity to work on everything from marine boat veneer to refurbishing historic buildings in London, including a project at Covington Gardens. His interest turned to furniture while working alongside a Rhode Island School of Design graduate. Philip quickly fell in love with the precision and craftsmanship required in furniture making and the unique challenge that every piece brought. Every project transformed a piece of wood into functional yet aesthetically inspirational pieces of art. Philip was able to apply his knowledge of traditional carpentry and joinery to the art of furniture making, and thus, the journey to starting Philip Morley Furniture Company had begun.

After moving to the United States in 2003, Philip continued exploring furniture design under Richard Chillcott in Apollo Beach, Florida. Working with the Chillcott Group opened his eyes to new design possibilities. After the birth of their first son, the Morley family moved to Texas where he served as an apprentice to master craftsman Michael Colca for six years. Under Michael, Philip truly honed his skills in furniture construction. As well, he was introduced to Austin Community College. Philip has been working as an adjunct professor in the Building Construction Technology Department teaching Advanced Woodworking, Cabinet I, and Jigs and Joints. Through teaching, he has been able to share his passion for his craft with others.

BUILDING BIRDHOUSES WITH KIDS - MULTNOMAH DAYS AND CLACKAMAS COUNTY FAIR

If you want to have fun on a Saturday morning nothing can



be finer than building birdhouses with young children. For the past eight years the Guild of Oregon Woodworkers and specifically Project Build has taken its show on the road and set up at Multnomah Days and the Clackamas County Fair. These are some of the young folks having fun.

All year long Project Build cuts parts for the houses - top, two sides, back and bottom - from donated

wood, primarily cedar fencing. Holland Golic has been our champion for the last two years and has done an excellent job of keeping inventory as parts are cut. He makes sure when the day arrives each location - the County Fair and Multnomah Days - gets enough of each piece to build from 150 to 175 houses. By the way, Holland is looking for a replacement so if this sounds interesting please contact Project Build

(<u>project.build.lead@guildoforegonwoodworkers.org</u>). There is a playbook to follow and regular guidance for this lucky volunteer. This is also a good link for donating cedar fencing.

History: For quite some time the Guild has looked at ways to get children involved in woodworking through various projects. These were restarted in 2012 by Larry Wade. In 2015 tool totes and birdhouses were activities the Guild worked on. By 2015 the Guild realized that these child friendly activities needed a home at the Guild. Ed Ferguson





suggested that PB carry the torch and the group has done so since then.

Bland MaCartha assumed the day's overall coordination responsibilities at Multnomah Days - arranging for the tents and tables, arriving at the beginning of set up and being there at the end for wrap up. Steve Anderly took the coordination responsibilities for the County Fair. Project Build is also looking for a new overall Multnomah Days coordinator.

Tualatin Wildife Refuge has been a regular partner on this project and currently loans the Guild its small hand held drivers which are perfect for small hands.

The plan for this T. Rex was posted online by a gentleman who had made one for his son. The parts were cut out of 3/4 and 1/2 inch plywood with a jigsaw. They join with halflap joints, so all the parts simply slip together, which makes for easy disassembly for storage. Since this will reside outside, however, I added a small strap and screws to secure the tail to the body, and I put a hole in the pelvis which allows it to be steadied by a pipe driven into the ground. The plan gives a six foot T. Rex, but a gentleman in New Zealand scaled it up to about 11 feet, which looked quite impressive in his photo. Mine will make appearances at holidays, and I'm thinking about a set of antlers and a red bulb for the nose at Christmas time. The pattern will be around for a while in case anyone is interested.


