Gideon Hughes: Custom Design and Style



Like the Willie Nelson song says, "we're on the road again." We haven't had a road trip for a while, so March seems like a good time to break the cabinet fever and get out. In February, we saw the creativity of Brett Stern and his amazing Gothic Revival "castle." In March, we will be seeing creativity through the whimsical eyes of Gideon Hughes, in what I am calling "Alice in Wonderland Revival." And all we need to do is take a short drive in Portland and skip the rabbit hole.

As I talk to professional woodworkers for our presentations, I find that they often prefer to present from their shop. It's where they do their work and where they are the most comfortable. Presenting from their shop has advantages for us too, because we get to see actual pieces of their work, often even works in progress, instead of merely pictures. A bit more work for us, per-





Gideon was originally scheduled to present in August, but you may remember (I'm actually trying to forget it), August 15, 2023 was 102 degrees, so we had to cancel. I visited Gideon's shop and studio in July of last year, and I can tell you that we are in for a treat. Gideon Hughes, of Gideon Hughes Woodworks, is a master craftsman who brags about being "old school." He says his design tools are paper and pencil, and his technology is a tape measure and story pole. He designs custom kitchens and cabinets, to pay the bills, but his creative work is full of whimsy with bright colors and flowing, twisting shapes. When you see one of his kitchen's, the first word that comes to mind is "beautiful." But it's impossible not to smile and chuckle when you see his water heater lingerie cabinet or his puzzle table. And who wouldn't want a twisty, curving chest of drawers, like the one pictured here, complete with blue drawer fronts and, whatever that is on top - is it a toupee? A mustache? A whisk of wind-blown hair? You got me, but it works.

Getting there: The place can be a bit hard to find, so I have included a map and a picture of the building (see them on page 3). You'll need take SE 20th south off SE Powell Blvd and then go around the block to get to 1801 SE Franklin. The entrance is on the left after you walk through the parking lot in the front. Gideon assures me there will be plenty of street parking at that time of night. I hope to see you there. I'll bring some chairs from the Guild.



GUILD SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM - A PAUSE

The Guild has been offering scholarships since 2016, when we began with an unsolicited grant from the Oregon Community Foundation. The Foundation has continued to support our work and a number of members have also given generously over the years. So generously, in fact, that we usually had more money than applicants.

We are now more in balance, since we have awarded several scholarships in the past 12 months, so it is time to review our focus.

The scholarship committee has therefore decided to pause and take stock of where we are. We don't plan to award any new scholarships until we have resolved some fundamental questions. These are just a few:

- Should our scholarships go only to members?
- Are they only for our own classes, or also for outside classes?
- Should they primarily support those who want a career in woodworking?
- Or should we try to encourage new members?
- Should we emphasize or affirmatively seek out nontraditional woodworkers?

Should we give extra credit to those who are active in the Guild?

I'm sure you can suggest more questions that we should consider.

The scholarship committee has met to discuss these questions but we quickly realized that more thought and discussion will be needed. Our goal is to develop some clear but flexible guidelines, so that we can restart the program as soon as possible.

If you would like to take part in these discussions, please let Tim Moore know, since he is the coordinator for the program. We welcome new points of view and would like to have another scholarship recipient on the committee, but would also welcome anyone who has some experience in selecting scholarship recipients, no matter what the fo-

And feel free to just let us know your thoughts, even if you don't want to serve on the committee.

Guild Fee Changes - April 1, 2024

In case you haven't heard, the Guild fees for membership and shop usage are changing on April 1, 2024.

Membership will increase by \$10 per membership level

- Machine Room shop time will be \$15/hour
- Bench Room shop time will be \$10/hour
- Unlimited shop usage for 12 months will be \$900; for 6 months will be \$600

On your next visit to the shop, you will see three new Saw Stops and a new spindle sander (all generously funded by a donor). However, the Guild cannot depend solely upon donations for equipment needs. The new shop fees will fund new (and repair of) equipment by those who actually use the equipment rather than spreading the cost across the general membership.

Of the Guild 1000+ members, only a fraction actually frequent the machine room. We have seen a marked increase in damage to equipment requiring repairs over the past year. Some of these are seemingly simple yet expensive - like torn drum sander abrasive sheets. Others require ordering new parts or replacement such as the happened with the table router and spindle sander.

The Board decided to institute Bench Room fees, as those are open shop slots that could be filled by a paying machine room user. The benefits of the Bench Room are numerous – providing a wide assortment of already sharp-

ened chisels, planes and saws, hand tools, etc. The fees for both areas still offer a great value given the professional grade equipment found in the shop. Users also benefit from the presence of a volunteer shop attendant - who is there to assist with safe use of tools and provide woodworking advice.

One way to offset the shop use fees is to volunteer. Volunteer hours can be converted into shop time. There $\overline{Standing}$ by the new saws are is always a wide range of volunteer positions available

GATHERING OF THE GUILDS

Wed., April 18 – Sun., April 21



The Gathering of the Guilds (GOTG) is one of the largest art shows in the Northwest. Six Guilds and hundreds of artists come together to display and sell

their custom made and unique creations at Oregon Convention Center. The Guild has the largest booth in the show, and this is our biggest community event of the year. Not only is this show an opportunity for us to sell our products, it is also a chance to present ourselves to our community and stress all that we do. The GOTG is an opportunity to spread the word about our education programs, our community service projects, and our skills as woodworkers. We use this show to stress the benefits the Guild can bring to the community and to recruit new members. The dates of the show are Friday, April 26 through Sunday, April 28, but we also need volunteers to set up on Wednesday and Thursday.

We need the help of our members to succeed. Please volunteer.

We need help moving in and setting up on Wednesday and Thursday. On Wednesday, the Project Build team will load the trailers at the Guild shop and

drive them to the Convention Center. We need people to help unload and set up our booth and to help other vendors unload and (sometimes) set up their booths. Thursday is mostly setup. You need to be able

to lift and carry a maximum of about 25 pounds for this work. Most of the stuff is light but can be bulky and awkward. If you help other vendors, ask them to handle anything that is fragile.

Friday, Saturday, and Sunday are the days of the show. The Guild has its own booth, and we have a small demonstration area next to the booth. In the booth, we talk to the customers and answer their questions, as well as selling our creations. As a volunteer, you will get questions about what we are selling or about the Guild. It's fun and can be fast paced. We will have at least one person as cashier to handle the money (mostly credit cards). We also need two people to do the demonstrations, which are usually making potpourri bags from shaving of aromatic cedar that we plane on site. This is a good activity to get people, especially kids, to experience "woodworking."

As participants in the GOTG, we must also help with run-

ning the show. This is simple, but during each day of the show one or two of our members may help oversee a common display booth by the entrance. This is mostly just sitting in the display area and directing interested customers to the vendors, who do the actual selling. It is not selling merchandise.

On Sunday afternoon, the show

ends at 4:00. We need to break down our booth and load everything into our trailers. You do not have to unload on Sunday night.




GOBY WALNUT HAS MOVED




