When Peter Tsiorba was recommended to me as a presenter, I was told he was a luthier. I had to look it up, because I honestly didn't know what a luthier was. Once I found out what he did, it was clear why he should present at the Guild. I'm not particularly musical, and I certainly know nothing about building a guitar, but, like many people, I love guitar music, so this was reason enough to have him as a presenter. In my conversations with him, and by looking at [his web page](#) and [Instagram](#) postings, I knew that our members would be as fascinated as I was about his craft. Twenty-five years ago, as a young college graduate and recent Portlander, Peter Tsiorba found himself at Pioneer Music on SW Park Street (now closed). Encountering handmade guitars for the first time had so profoundly impressed him that to this day, Peter thinks of that moment as the beginning of his journey toward guitar building.

Unable to afford a handmade guitar, he walked away from that guitar store empty-handed, but not empty-hearted! The crazy idea of making his own guitar from scratch was born that day. Little did he know that his DIY guitar dream would take him on a journey through Europe, visits to guitar shops in Spain, a furniture making job in New England, and his eventual return to Portland where he now lives and builds classical and flamenco guitars.

Along the way, he learned just how little he knew when he embarked on this journey. Life's deep mysteries are not easily solved, and to this day, Peter ponders perfect glues, enduring finishes, dubious clamping schemes, guitar acoustics, and restoration techniques.

As a fellow woodworker and a musical instrument builder, Peter hopes to share his perspectives on these topics:

- workshop space and organization
- benches
- vises and work holding devices
- tool storage and organization
- favorite glues and finishes
- maintaining enthusiasm & a fresh perspective
- working methods and how he balances hand-tool work with batch production (jigs and set-ups)

NOTES FROM THE GUILD PRESIDENT



Dear Members

**A Request from
Ed Swakon, President
Guild of Oregon Wood-
workers**

I'm asking you as a member of the Guild to contribute to the Guild's 2022 Capital Campaign. This April we negotiated an extension and expansion for our existing shop

workspace. The additional 1,800 square feet of shop space is currently occupied by the martial arts dojo across the parking lot. This added space increases our total shop space by over 50% to over 5,100 square feet. We take possession of the new space on August 1st. The new lease and additional space will allow us to:

- ◆ Grow the number and variety of our classes and workshops with dedicated classroom space
- ◆ Allow greater efficiency to meet the increasing demand for training and educational programs
- ◆ Expand and improve our multimedia equipment for class presentations and Guild meetings/activities
- ◆ Provide increased member access to shop equipment and open shop time
- ◆ Upgrade our health and safety systems and shop equipment in our existing shop

- ◆ Increase our ability to serve our community service nonprofit partners

To fund these space and programming improvements the Board approved a Capital Campaign to raise \$150,000 this year. The following info explains the campaign in more detail.

We launched this 2022 capital campaign on May 1st by asking our existing Officers and Board of Directors to be the first to donate. **I am pleased to tell you that ALL of our Officers and Board members have made a personal contribution to the campaign.** We have raised over 10% of our 2022 goal to date.

2022 CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

YOUR CONTRIBUTION MAKES A DIFFERENCE

Campaign Explanation

Since 1978, we have been a 100% member-supported organization:

- ◆ The Guild offers more than 150 classes, workshops, demonstrations, and seminars annually
- ◆ The Guild provides and maintains a clean and safe shop workspace available to Guild members
- ◆ We serve the community by building projects for organizations throughout the metro area
- ◆ The Guild is instrumental in building a vibrant wood-working community throughout the Northwest

Since 2010, our Guild has seen a fivefold increase in membership. Regaining our growth momentum from 'pre-COVID' days we have once again reached more than 1,000 members.

Our Current Shop Workspace

Since 2008, the Guild of Oregon Woodworkers has operated in a 3,000-square-foot leased space in Multnomah Village, providing educational classes, community projects, and shop space for use of its members. Our workspace includes:

- ◆ A Bench Room that includes workbenches and hand tools, and is used for meetings, classes and workshops, and multimedia productions.
- ◆ A Machine Room which includes industrial wood-working equipment: jointers, planers, table saws, miter saws, bandsaws, sanders, routers, and drill presses with dust collection and air filtration.
- ◆ An extensive lending library that includes books, magazines, and videos on all woodworking topics
- ◆ A storage annex which includes supplies and equipment for the various Guild activities

Growing Once Again

In April, 2022, we negotiated a lease extension through 2027 with an expansion of our shop workspace, to more than 5,100 square feet. The new space will now allow us to:

- ◆ Grow the number and variety of our classes and workshops with dedicated classroom space, to allow us to meet the increasing demand for training and educational programs
- ◆ Expand our multimedia equipment for class presentations, Guild meetings/activities, and access to wood-working resources/programs, from the around the country and the globe

- ◆ Extend our bench room and shop space for increased member access to shop time, and to allow us to upgrade our health and safety systems and shop equipment
- ◆ Increase our ability to serve our community service non-profit partners



To financially prepare for this expansion, the Board has built a sufficient capital reserve allowing the Guild to fund \$50,000 to get started on the first phase of our expansion. On May 1st we kicked off a \$150,000 Capital Fundraising Campaign to complete the improvements. We maintain a six-month operating reserve fund and we are conservatively projecting our future revenues and expenses associated with this added leased space.

What Are We Doing With The Money?

Purchases and expenditures for the new space include:

Phase 1 Equipment and supplies including benches, tools, AV equipment, and supplies.

Upgrades to the new space including lighting/electrical, security, dust collection, and air filtration.

Phase 2 Updates and Upgrades to Existing Shop Workspace: Improvements to address shop health and safety, additional soundproofing, dust collection, and air filtration, efficiency improvements, electrical, HVAC, and equipment purchases.

We Are Asking For Your Support

We launched our campaign on May 1st by asking our existing Officers and Board of Directors to be the first to contribute. **All of our Officers and Board members have made a *personal* contribution to the campaign.** Now we bring this campaign to you, our fellow members.

THE EXCITEMENT GROWS

Just imagine. The 'rubber is hitting the road' when it comes to our expanded space in Unit B-2, the current karate school space. We will assume that you read last month's article so let's look at what has happened since.

The **Education** Program has presented a proposal for the use if this space that is impressive in its scope.

During the first year of operation the goal is to steadily increase the number of classes to over 30 classes per month in the areas of safety and woodworking. The space will include quality basic machinery adequate to meet most class needs and have up to 12 workbenches.

A team has been working on the design of the workbenches. The plan is to have a number of different style benches so that members can see and use various options. A team of members is now beginning to actually build those benches. If you are interested in participating in this project, contact Tim Moore.

All of our current hand tools are being inventoried. Once we complete that inventory, we will be able to make some decisions. The plan is to make the B-2 space our primary hand-tool workshop but to leave a sufficient number of quality hand tools in the existing bench room so that they are available for open shop use.

Stay tuned for an update on this next month as we move closer and closer to our August 1 occupancy date.

**501C3 –
A Win-Win Situation**

Our federal government recognizes several types of businesses. There are Corporations, Sole Proprietorships, Limited Liability Corporations, and several more with different benefits that go with the designations. Our Guild is none of these, the Guild is a 501-c-3 Charitable corporation.

This designation gives us some special benefits tax-wise in trade for some special work from us with the skills that we have. It is a Win-Win for us. The IRS is recognizing us as a VOLUNTEER organization; we do not have any officers being paid, they are volunteers.

Another item on this list is that the public can donate money or machines, or wood, or just about anything to the Guild and then they can get a tax deduction on their own taxes. We can take that donation and apply it however we would like. Another Win-Win.

As a charitable nonprofit, we also work with other charitable nonprofits. GOOW members are able to gain skills, share skills, explore new methods in the woodworking field, AND give back to their community. Through the work of GOOW Teams - Project Build, Toys, and Community Projects - the Guild has built numerous garden benches, secure garbage cans for the forest camps, chests of drawers, and movable library bookshelves for various nonprofits that have found our services invaluable. We've also donated thousands of toys to various organizations including Volunteers of America, Toys for Tots, and Raphael House (a domestic violence shelter) and others for distribution. The impact that the Guild has had on our struggling, marginalized, or challenged population has been stellar. Another BIG WIN-WIN

SAFETY CLASSES

INTRO TO GUILD SAFETY

Instructor: Jeff Hilber

- ◆ 3-hour class
- ◆ *Prerequisites: Guild Membership*

This is an entry-level class required of all members who wish to utilize the Guild Shop bench room or machine room. It provides an overview of the Guild and available programs. It is also the introduction to Guild safety requirements and includes a tour of the existing shop and included equipment. This class is additionally used to determine which new members might benefit from the Getting Started class.

GETTING STARTED – HANDS ON WITH PORTABLE POWER TOOLS

The Getting Started class is a continuation of the safety process in good woodworking practices taught in the Intro to the Guild class. Getting Started is a required class for those needing experience with the safe and appropriate use of portable power tools, prior to starting the path to the Guild's Shop Certification classes. This is a four-hour class, with 2-1/2 hours of practice with a jig saw, a trim router, a random orbital sander, drill motors (battery and corded), a circular saw and installing their accessories.

CORE TOOL CERTIFICATION

- ◆ 8-hour class
- ◆ *Prerequisites: Intro to Guild Safety & Getting Started (as applicable)*

CORE TOOL PRACTICE

- ◆ 3-hour class
- ◆ *Prerequisites: Core Tool Certification*

This class is designed for the member to become certified on the "Core Tools" and is required to work in the Guild machine room or to take classes using the "core" power tools. The class consists of two 4-hour sessions and will certify the member on the commonly used "core" power tools: chop saw, bandsaw, jointer, planer, table saw, stationary sanders and the drill press.

In an effort to bridge the gap between safety training and use, the Guild is offering a three-hour mentoring session for members who have completed the Core Tools Certification Training and need more practice. A minimum of two volunteer mentors will be present to provide hands-on assistance. Depending on their skill level, this class may be required for some members to obtain core tool certification.

ADVANCED TOOL CERTIFICATION (ATC): ROUTERS/ROUTER TABLE

Instructors: Bill Hamilton; Mark Klein

This class is about safe use of router and router table and is designed to result in Shop Certification on these machines. The class will focus on the best practices for each operation. The member will see it demonstrated, and have the opportunity to perform the procedures themselves, hands on.

ATC: SLIDING TABLE SAW

- ◆ *Prerequisites: Core Tool Certification*

The goal of this training is to provide the member with the information, demonstration, and practice to ensure the safe use of this machine. The member will be required to demonstrate that they have understood the information presented and can successfully complete the trained tasks in a safe manner.

ATC: MULTI-ROUTER

The Multi-Router is a mortise & tenon machine for commercial or heavy-duty production of almost any solid-wood joint imaginable. This is an Advanced Tool with the Guild and is the most effective when completing multiple joints with the same or similar setup. This is a step-by-step guide to use the JDS multi-router to build a mortise and tenon.

ATC: PANTO-ROUTER

Instructor: Mark Klein

- ◆ 4-hour class
- ◆ *Prerequisites: Core Tool Certification*

The PantoRouter™ uses a guide bearing to follow a template which moves the router bit to cut a pattern identical in shape but 1/2 the size. This class focuses on learning how to use the machine safely. Making various joints will be demonstrated and the trainees will then perform the operations on their own to receive certification for the use of this tool.

ATC: WIDE BELT SANDER

Instructor: Tim Moore

- ◆ 3-hour class
- ◆ *Prerequisites: Core Tool Certification & Being a Shop Attendant*

This is training on the safe use of the Wide Belt Sander. Shop rules require the use of this machine to be managed directly by a Shop Attendant (SA) in order to ensure safety of both machine and user. The class will focus on the basic use of the machine including set up, changing the belt, adjusting the height procedures, and other related functions. Class is for SA's only at this time.

The Basics of Fine Woodworking Series is designed to provide beginning or basic woodworkers with the most critical information as a foundation for a more intensive journey into woodworking. 

They're essentially small exercises in marquetry. The photo shows some examples from his DVD with variations to try different background veneer colors and sand shading patterns as well as a practice leg showing their use. Ruth Warbington suggested that these would make good coasters, so included in the photo is one I copied from the Guild logo to try out the idea. Christmas is, after all, only six short months away.

CARD SCRAPERS

By John Sheridan

Card Scrapers are thin pieces of steel, either squared off, measuring 2 1/2" by 6", or with curved edges, can for the most part eliminate the need to sand the wood of a project. One can go from planing or shaping with a rasp or file to scraping to finished without needing sandpaper. The Guild shop has a selection of card scrapers, but they are not yet properly prepared. To be useful they need to have turned edges, called burrs, to smooth the wood. The scraper is also more comfortable to use if the top edges are curved to fit the hand.

The steps of preparation of the scraper (first shown in Fine Woodworking #6 by Tage Frid) are (1) file the edge straight with a metal working mill file, (2) smooth the edge with a stone, diamond stones work best, (3) with the scraper in a vice or holder, draw out the burr with a hardened piece of steel called a burnisher, and (4) turn the burr about 4 degrees to make a workable cutter. #5, use and enjoy a productive tool.

There will be a short presentation about card scrapers at the June Guild meeting. Questions and suggestions will be welcome.
