Congratulations, and thank you all for stepping up to the plate to serve the Guild. The Guild's organizational chart is extensive, with many opportunities to help. Your help would be appreciated.

Membership Dues and Shop fees to increase in 2024

At its November meeting, the Guild's Board adopted a resolution to increase our membership fees by 10% and to increase the shop time hourly rate to \$15 an hour starting in April 2024. As you may recall, we convened a working group earlier this year to examine the Guild revenue sources. Many alternatives were discussed. The Guild's expenses, including our rent, consumables, utilities, etc., continue to increase. Membership dues only pay a fraction of those costs today. Our focus is to maintain a robust financial condition for the guild. Even with these modest increases, membership in the Guild is, in my opinion, a bargain.

End of Year Giving

Each year, we ask our members who are in a position to do so to make an end-of-year donation to the Guild. I will be sending each of you a letter (via email) asking for your contribution. This upcoming year's focus is on shop maintenance and capital equipment replacement reserve. Remember, the Guild is a 501 C-3 registered non-profit.

EDUCATION HAPPENINGS...

For 2024, we will be providing a schedule of Regular and Repeating (R&R) classes. These are the general safety and woodworking classes that will be the foundation of the overall class delivery plan. There will be other classes as well but these may be delivered only once or will be the pilots of future routine classes.

We are now posting the January schedule of our WOOD-WORKING R&R classes (month #1 of the first quarter). We are also getting Class Assistants assigned as needed.

GOAL: The goal is that the first quarter schedule will become the basic template for each of the following quarters. There are, of course, variables that will require some differences between quarters but at least we will have a starting template.

The **2024 Class Catalogue** has also been completed and will be available soon. It includes a list of current instructors, safety classes and the R&R woodworking classes. You will find it through our website. Go to Education/ Education and click on the link CLASS CATALOGUE.

CLASS ASSISTANTS: We are also developing methods to give notice of Class Assistant (CA) opportunities a little more systematically than in the past. For those not familiar with this role, it is a great way to get your foot in the door of the Education program and personally get valuable information though participation in the classes.

CORE TOOL CLASS ASSISTANTS: There are four CORE TOOL CERTIFICATION classes each month. These are generally developed at least a couple of months in advance. Openings for Class Assistants are provided weekly in the Guild's Upcoming Events email. The notice will provide instructions for applying.

WOODWORKING CLASS ASSISTANTS: We will begin providing notice of CA opportunities in the R&R classes by sending out the list of openings via email. In most cases, these will require that the interested member contact the instructor for assignment and approval. Watch for the prerequisites that will be attached to these notices.

SERIES CLASSES: For the present, these will be determined by the series coordinator or instructors.

ONE-TIME AND PILOT CLASSES: Method yet to be determined.

MASTERS WORKSHOP CLASS ASSISTANTS: These will be coordinated and approved, as in the past, by Masters' Lead Chip Webster.

HAND TOOL KITS

Thanks to two very generous anonymous benefactors, the Guild Studio now has seven complete hand tool kits for use in the Education curriculum!

Tim Moore and Ken Hall headed up a team that determined what should be included in a good starter kit. Each kit contains a set of saws, planes, chisels, and measuring and marking tools... the basic ingredients for getting started in hand tool woodworking.

Project Build undertook the construction of toolboxes for the kits. Ed Ferguson led the project, with major contributions from Bob Mack and Pat Shuff. Several other regulars pitched in. A special tip of the hat to Rick Martin for inscribing the tools in each set and to Ed Swakon for laser engraved labels on the boxes.

The Studio already has a good inventory of hand tools for use in the various class offerings. The intent in creating the kits is to provide a standardized set of basic hand tools in one toolbox so that instructors can count on complete and consistent sets for each student. The kits got a posi-

tive reception in a trial run in Bob Mack's recent dovetail class. The development team will be looking for opportunities to refine and improve the kits as instructors work with them.

A CREATIVE PROCESS

Woodworkers looking for ways to think more creatively about the working of wood for sculpture or furniture or treenware (the traditional name for the small stuff) might look no further than the 1952 collection of essays called The Creative Process, edited by Brewster Ghiselin, emeritus professor at the University of California. The selected essays offer suggestions to find insights for one's work.

Of course, one has to first prepare and become competent to be inspired. As Ghiselin says in the introduction: "Every genuinely creative worker must attain in one way or another such full understanding of the medium, and such skill, ingenuity, and flexibility in handling it that he (she) can make fresh use of it to construct a device which, when used skillfully by others, will organize their experiences the way that his (her) own experience was organized in the moment of expanded insight." For example consider the original Sam Maloof rocker and the thousands of copies. The book encourages getting intensely into a working "zone" of concentration and inspiration. The volume and its reflections on invention in the arts and sciences was suggested to me by notes in a diary of my talented, late wife, the woodworker, Carolyn Grew-Sheridan. The Creative Process is still in print and available at Powell's.



Many Guild members recognize that woodworking can be a lonely avocation especially if you work alone in your shop. It's fun to get together with other woodworker's to swap stories, share successes, and failures, and to ask questions.


